

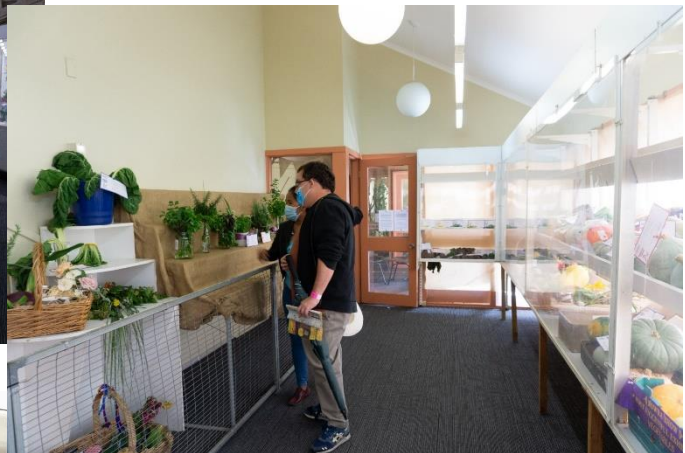

- 1) An exhibit may only be entered in one class.
- 2) Exhibits must have been completed within the 18 months prior to the 2024 Nowra Show unless otherwise specified.
- 3) All prize winning exhibits in each class shall be displayed in the Pavilion together with as many other exhibits as space will permit.
- 4) It is not always possible to display the whole article (eg: quilts) as sufficient space may not be available.
- 5) Exhibits cannot be connected to Mains Power during the Show.
- 6) Pavilion will close at 10.00 pm on Saturday and re-open on Sunday between 10.00 am and 11.00 am for removal of exhibits.
- 7) No exhibit may be removed from the Pavilion before Sunday morning.
- 8) Prizemoney will be paid on Sunday between 10.00 am and 11.00 am.
- 9) Prizemoney not collected within a week of the show will be a donation to the Society.
- 10) Unless otherwise arranged, the Society will not be responsible for exhibits unclaimed by 12 noon Sunday.
- 11) The Society shall not be responsible in the event of any loss or damage to any exhibit howsoever arising.

Pavilion will open at 8am - 10am Thursday 8th February for the staging of general exhibits.

Pavilion will be open between **6.00 pm and 7.00 pm Wednesday and from 8am to 10am Thursday** for staging of exhibits in **Cut Flowers, Decorative Flowers, Junior Decorative Flower and Dahlia sections.**

Judging commences from **10.30 am Thursday**. Photography section judged one week prior to Show.

Judges: Local Show Societies are interested in obtaining the names of people willing to judge Pavilion Sections.

Judges will award (1) 150th Commemorative Medal in each Section.

Hints for baking scones for Exhibitions/Shows

First of all, read the Show Schedule thoroughly.

Have a hot oven, know your oven.

When cooked, brush off any excess flour, top and underneath, with pastry brush.

To avoid flour on bottom of scones, line the baking tray with baking paper.

Scones should be medium brown on top and light brown underneath.

Sometimes it makes a difference whatever scone tray is used, for the bottom of the scones.

Experiment prior to Show.

Scones must be same size and shape, if possible. If mixture is too soft, gradually add a bit more flour.

It is better to have a soft mixture and add extra flour than to have a stiff mixture and add extra liquid as this can make the top hard and the scone heavy.

When cooked, cover with tea towel to keep the top soft.

Hints of Exhibition Cooking

It is important you read the Schedule carefully. Check closing time for entries.

Read your recipe - it could mean a difference between success and failure.

Always weigh your ingredients.

Never turn your cake onto cake cooler. The marks are regarded as a decoration.

Place on board covered with tea towels.

Do not use package cake - unless stated.

Use castor sugar for finer cakes.

Most important to use fresh ingredients, especially shortening.

Do not use cornflour in sponge unless on schedule.

Do not use ring tin unless stated.

Do not put your cakes in plastic containers or bags before judging as this can draw moisture - use cellophane for best results.

Biscuits and pikelets should be dainty.

Lamingtons should be butter mixture, approximately 4cm.

Ice cake on top only unless otherwise stated.

Weigh sponge mixture for even heights.

Do not over flavour especially soda.

Do not trim cake.

You have taken care with your cake, so take care with your presentation.

Thick cardboard covered with foil is good to display your cakes on.

Take pride in your exhibit. The Judge can tell when care is taken.

Details of Rich Fruit Cake Competition

The winner of the Rich Fruit Cake competition at Nowra Show will then proceed to the Zone Final judging to be held at the Group Meeting on 4th November, 2023 at 10.00am and 2nd November, 2024. The Zone winner will then go on to compete at the Sydney Royal Easter Show. Cakes must be uncut.

The following recipe is compulsory for all entrants.

INGREDIENTS:

250g (8 oz) sultanas

250 g (8 oz) chopped raisins

250 g (8 oz) currants

125 g (4 oz) chopped mixed peel

90 g (3oz) chopped red glace cherries, 90 g (3 oz) chopped blanched almonds, 1/3 cup sherry or brandy,

250g (8 oz) plain flour, 60 g (2 oz) self-raising flour, 1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger, 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves, 250g (8 oz) butter, 250g (8 oz) soft brown sugar, 1/2 teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind, 1/2 teaspoon almond essence, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla essence, 4 large eggs.

RECOMMENDED METHOD:

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight. Sift together the flours and spices Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences. Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after, each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures. Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon. Place the mixture into a prepared square 20cm x 20cm (8" x 8") tin and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3 1/2 - 4 hours. Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4-6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3-4 pieces.

A sample of the yarn, fabric or fibre with label must be attached to each item making up the exhibit. If a label is not available (as in a handspun/felted item) a handwritten label with relevant details and sample will suffice.

An exhibit in this competition may consist of the work of one individual or a group of individuals, or an organisation.

All three articles/garments must have been completed within the 12 months prior to the local show and made by the exhibitor/s.

An exhibit having won at a local show may be exhibited (the same three articles/garments) at the Group Final.

The winning exhibit at the Group Final is then eligible to compete in the State Final.

An exhibit is only eligible to represent one Society at Group level and one Group at State Level.

An exhibit (article/garment) that has previously competed at Group level is not eligible to compete again.

If this Class is not scheduled or attracts no entries at a local show, the Chief Pavilion Steward in consultation with the appropriate Pavilion Section Judges, may select three (3) suitable individual exhibits and, with the exhibitor's permission, enter them in the Group Judging as an exhibit representing the particular Society concerned.
